Executive Summary

Lisa Westwood is a Registered Professional Archaeologist with 24 years of cultural resource management experience (as of 2018), which is composed of contract archaeology, museum curation, and teaching experience in northern and central California, southern Utah, New Mexico, and the Midwest. She exceeds the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for prehistoric and historical archaeologist, holding a B.A. degree in Anthropology from the University of Iowa and an M.A. degree in Anthropology (Archaeology) from Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. Her technical areas of expertise include: regulatory compliance and cultural resources law; human bone (osteological) identification and analysis; Ancestral Puebloan archaeology; lithic debitage identification; and the emerging field of space heritage. She is the sole, senior, or contributing author to over 300 archaeology and cultural resources management technical reports and publications. In addition to regularly teaching part time in the anthropology departments at California State University-Chico and Butte College, and occasionally Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso, Ms. Westwood serves as the Director of Cultural Resources at ECORP Consulting, Inc., an environmental consulting firm headquartered near Sacramento, California.

Ms. Westwood is a co-founder of the Apollo 11 Preservation Task Force, a volunteer committee of preservation professionals who are working toward designation of Tranquility Base on the moon as a World Heritage site. She led the effort to list the Objects Associated with Tranquility Base on the California Register of Historical Resources, which was achieved in January 2010, followed by a successful listing on the New Mexico State Register of Cultural Properties. This successful effort represents the first time a cultural resource not located on Earth was designated on an historical registry. She has been actively working with members of Congress to have the site designated a National Historic Landmark and is seeking World Heritage List designation for the site.

Ms. Westwood recently co-chaired and organized the symposia on space heritage at the 2011 and 2013 Society for American Archaeology annual meetings. Her papers present the challenges and possible solutions to seeking formal cultural resources management of Tranquility Base from legal, national, and international perspectives. She has been featured or appeared in numerous media reports and interviews, including the television program, *California Life with Heather Dawson, Reuters International*, the *Washington* Post, NASA and the Smithsonian Institution's Key Moments in Human Spaceflight Symposium, and *Space Times Magazine*, among many others. She is also a regular contributor to the publication, *Quest: The History of Human Spaceflight*.
