**Subject Matter Competency Program in Spanish**

The department offers majors and minors in French, German, and Spanish, a minor in Italian, and a minor in Japanese. The French and Spanish programs offer honors in the major. All courses are taught in the target language unless otherwise indicated in the course description.

Majoring in a foreign language means studying the language, literature, and culture of the country concerned. Knowledge of a foreign language deepens people's understanding of their own culture and language and contributes toward a greater appreciation of other cultures.

The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures' goals and objectives for our students are:

1. Development of professional and marketable mastery of communicative skills in one or more foreign languages other than English;
2. Appropriation of linguistic skills, transferable selectively to a wide range of practical options, including—but not limited to—mass media, higher education, travel/leisure enterprises, the performing arts, teaching, diplomacy, law enforcement, military intelligence, the space program, business/marketing, international banking, politics, the Peace Corps, etc.;
3. Acquisition of knowledge and sensitivity about one or more literary and cultural heritages/traditions other than those of English-speaking countries;
4. Internalization of the principle of diversity as one of the cornerstones of personal, national, and international relationships, and promotion of its inherent values in the world at large;
5. Achievement of a high degree of information literacy by accessing national and international sources, and judicious evaluation of the same for form, value, and content.

The department's Multimedia Language Learning Center allows faculty and students to use advanced technologies to further the acquisition of world languages and cultural awareness. The applications of this technology enhance the department's capability to fulfill its mission in teaching and learning.

Depending on the semester, Arabic, Chinese, Hebrew, and Latin are offered as four-unit introductory courses. Other Hebrew, Portuguese, and Russian as well as Greek are offered as three-unit, non-general education courses (self instructional program with some classroom instruction).



**International Programs**

Students have an opportunity to study for a year through the California State University International Programs. California State University International Program opportunities pertaining to languages taught in the department are in Canada (Quebec), Chile, China, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Spain, and Taiwan. Students also have the option of studying abroad for a semester, year, or summer through the University Studies Abroad Consortium. Both these sponsoring organizations of study abroad have scholarships for interested students. See the University's study abroad advisor for more information. Approval of course equivalencies from study abroad programs must be authorized by the department prior to studying abroad.

**Career Outlook**

A degree in a foreign language increases employment prospects with employers such as the government, multinational corporations, airlines, shipping companies, wineries, travel agencies, hospitals, education, technology, and music. Foreign language competency is necessary in different international programs (international relations, international business) and area studies programs (Africa, Asia, Europe, Latin America, Middle East, and Pacific Basin). In California and many other states, Spanish is a useful adjunct in the fields of social welfare, medicine, elementary and secondary teaching, and other areas of public service.

For students planning to attend graduate school, the knowledge of a foreign language is an important research tool and is a requirement in most disciplines.

**Scholarships**

Scholarship opportunities are the following: The Outstanding Japanese Student Scholarship was established in 2007 and is awarded yearly based on GPA in Japanese. The Bix Whitcomb award goes to an honors student in English or Spanish for study abroad. The Italian Program offers scholarships every year to further the study of Italian and Italian-American studies. There is also an exchange program with the University of Mainz in Germany which provides a scholarship for one student of German each year.

### Honors in the Major

Honors in the Major is a program of independent work in your major. It requires 6 units of honors course work completed over two semesters.

The Honors in the Major program allows you to work closely with a faculty mentor in your area of interest on an original performance or research project. This year-long collaboration allows you to work in your field at a professional level and culminates in a public presentation of your work. Students sometimes take their projects beyond the University for submission in professional journals, presentation at conferences, or academic competition. Such experience is valuable for graduate school and professional life. Your honors work will be recognized at your graduation, on your permanent transcripts, and on your diploma. It is often accompanied by letters of commendation from your mentor in the department or the department chair.

Some common features of Honors in the Major program are

1. You must take 6 units of Honors in the Major course work. All 6 units are honors classes (marked by a suffix of H), and at least 3 of these units are independent study (399H, 499H, 599H) as specified by your department. You must complete each class with a minimum grade of B.
2. You must have completed 9 units of upper-division course work or 21 overall units in your major before you can be admitted to Honors in the Major. Check the requirements for your major carefully, as there may be specific courses that must be included in these units.
3. Your *cumulative* GPA should be at least 3.5 or within the top 5% of majors in your department.
4. Your GPA in your *major* should be at least 3.5 or within the top 5% of majors in your department.
5. Most students apply for or are invited to participate in Honors in the Major during the second semester of their junior year. Then they complete the 6 units of course work over the two semesters of their senior year.
6. Your honors work culminates with a public presentation of your honors project.

While Honors in the Major is part of the Honors Program, each department administers its own program. Please contact your major department or major advisor to apply.

### Japanese Language Placement Exam

#### Exit Assessment

The test and survey provide an important set of information for the program to further refine the quality of curriculum and to better serve the students.

SPAN 201 and SPAN 202 are a required component of the Minor in Spanish. However, students who have equivalent knowledge in Spanish may challenge these courses by enrolling in the class and taking the challenge exam. All students challenging a course must submit an official letter requesting to challenge the course to the department chair by the end of the second week of the semester. See the *University Catalog* section on challenging courses for further instructions. Students who request credit for prior experience and credit by examination also may receive credit for these courses. See the *University Catalog* on Credit for Prior Experience.

### Spanish Language Placement Exam

The Spanish language placement exam is taken to assess the placement level and to place students at the most appropriate level in the curriculum of the Spanish program at CSU, Chico.

## The Single Subject Matter Preparation Program in Spanish

### Course requirements for the Single Subject Matter Preparation Program, 37-53 units, in conjunction with the Professional Education Program, leads to a Single Subject Teaching Credential.

In most majors, candidates for this credential will normally fulfill the single subject matter preparation program by completing the appropriate education option in the major. Any exceptions to this procedure are noted at the end of this section. In addition to the single subject matter preparation program, completion of an additional professional education program is required to qualify for a California teaching credential. Professional education (credential) programs are available through the School of Education. For prerequisites and other admission requirements to professional education programs, see the "Education" chapter of this catalog.

Your departmental credential advisor is responsible for verifying that the subject matter preparation program has been completed. If you are interested in obtaining a teaching credential, confer with the appropriate credential advisor early in your University career. Department credential advisors can assist you in planning an educational program that meets both major and credential requirements.

Subject matter preparation requirements are governed by state legislative action and approval of the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing. Requirements may change between catalogs. Please consult with your departmental credential advisor for current information.

SPAN 425 Spanish Teaching 3.0 SP

SPAN 497 Spanish Exam and WP 1.0 FS WP

Prerequisites: ENGL 130 (or its equivalent) with a grade of C- or higher; upper-division standing. To be taken concurrently with any upper-division Spanish course.

SPAN 497 should be taken during the senior year and concurrently with any other upper-division Spanish (SPAN) course.

**9 units selected from:**

Any other upper-division Spanish (SPAN) courses, except SPAN 354, not taken previously, to include at least one additional 400-level course.

The study of at least four semesters of another foreign language is recommended, but not required.

### Criteria for Assessment of Subject Matter Competence

To receive department recommendation for the Single Subject Matter Preparation Program, a student must have a minimum 3.0 average in upper-division course work. GPA will be calculated on the upper-division courses which are required for the Spanish major.

### Procedure for Assessment of Subject Matter Competence

If the minimum criteria listed above are met, the student's records will be circulated among all Spanish faculty for comment.

After evaluating the faculty recommendations, the Teacher Education Committee will determine the subject matter competence and teaching potential for entering the Professional Education Program.

State of California foreign language requirements for high school graduates make it necessary that we closely review candidates. Therefore, determination of subject matter competence may entail an interview in the target language.

Candidates are urged to submit their records for subject matter assessment to the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures well in advance of the Department of Education's deadline for applications to the Professional Education Program.

**FLNG 315 Myth and History in European Cinema 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: HIST 103 or HIST 110.  
 Discusses the ways in which film reflects and shapes European society since World War I. Examines the relationships of history, politics, and cinema in Italy, France, Germany, Britain, and the former Soviet Union. 2.0 hours activity, 2.0 hours lecture. Special fee required; see the Class Schedule. This course is also offered as HIST 315. (003772)

**FLNG 340 Literary Masterpieces in Translation 3.0 Inquire**

A stylistic and thematic analysis of major works in French, German, Hispanic, Italian, and other literatures in English translation. Course content varies each semester according to language area taught. (003767)

**FLNG 398 Special Topics 1.0-3.0 Fa/Spr**

This course is for special topics offered for 1.0-3.0 units. Typically the topic is offered on a one-time-only basis and may vary from term to term and be different for different sections. See the Class Schedule for the specific topic being offered. (003773)

**FLNG 399 Special Problems 1.0-3.0 Fa/Spr**

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (003776)

**FLNG 610 Technology and Second Language Learning 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Permission of instructor.  
 Study and practical application of research, theories, and issues related to second language learning methods and the introduction of technology into the curriculum. Course is taught in English. (003782)

**Arabic Course Offerings**

**ARAB 101 First-Semester Arabic 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to basic Arabic language and culture. Emphasis of the course is on speaking and listening. Students learn through three hours of weekly sessions with a native speaker and self-instruction using texts and cassette tapes. (000680)

**ARAB 101A Beginning Arabic I 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to Arabic language and culture. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Arabic. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020747)

**ARAB 102 Second-Semester Arabic 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ARAB 101.  
 Continuation of ARAB 101 in the self-instructional format. (000681)

**ARAB 102A Beginning Arabic II 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ARAB 101A.  
 Continuation of ARAB 101A. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Arabic. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020748)

**ARAB 103 Third-Semester Arabic 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ARAB 102.  
 Continuation of ARAB 102 in the self-instructional format. Emphasis on developing reading and writing. (000682)

**ARAB 104 Fourth-Semester Arabic 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ARAB 103.  
 Continuation of ARAB 103 in the self-instructional format. Further development of reading and writing. (000683)

**ARAB 201 Intermediate Arabic I 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ARAB 102A.  
 Students review and expand language skills and cultural concepts introduced in ARAB 101A and ARAB 102A. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020749)

**ARAB 202 Intermediate Arabic II 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ARAB 201.  
 Students review and expand language skills and cultural concepts introduced in ARAB 101A, ARAB 102A, and ARAB 201. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020750)

**ARAB 211 Conversational Arabic 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ARAB 102A.  
 Practice in the spoken language. Focus is on comprehension, expression, and vocabulary building. (020751)

**Chinese Course Offerings**

**CHNS 101 First-Semester Chinese 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to Chinese language and culture. Development of basic skills in listening, speaking, reading, writing, and awareness of cultural concepts. Emphasis of the course is on listening and speaking. About 100 Chinese characters are introduced for reading and writing. (001956)

**CHNS 101A Beginning Chinese I 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to Chinese language and Culture. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading and writing Chinese. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020752)

**CHNS 102 Second-Semester Chinese 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: CHNS 101.  
 Continuation of CHNS 101. Emphasis on the basic skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing. Development of reading and writing ability using about 200 Chinese characters. Rapid expansion of vocabulary, basic grammatical structures, and understanding of cultural aspects in language use. (001959)

**CHNS 102A Beginning Chinese II 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: CHNS 101A.  
 Continuation of CHNS 101A. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Chinese. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020753)

**CHNS 103 Third-Semester Chinese 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: CHNS 102.  
 Reviewing and expanding of language skills introduced in Chinese 101 and 102. Emphasis on developing writing and reading. (001962)

**CHNS 104 Fourth-Semester Chinese 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: CHNS 103.  
 Reviewing and expanding of language skills introduced in Chinese 101, 102, and 103. Further development of writing and reading. (001965)

**CHNS 201 Intermediate Chinese I 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: CHNS 102A.  
 Students review and expand language skills and cultural concepts introduced in CHNS 101A and CHNS 102A. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020754)

**CHNS 202 Intermediate Chinese II 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: CHNS 201.  
 Students review and expand language skills and cultural concepts introduced in CHNS 101A, CHNS 102A, and CHNS 201. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020755)

**CHNS 211 Conversational Chinese 3.0 Inquire**

Practice in the spoken language. Focus is on comprehension, expression, and vocabulary building. (020756)

**French Course Offerings**

**FREN 101 First-Semester French 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to French language and culture. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing French. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (003787)

**FREN 102 Second-Semester French 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: FREN 101 or equivalent.  
Continuation of FREN 101. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing French. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (003792)

**FREN 201 Third-Semester French 4.0 Fall**

Prerequisites: FREN 102 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in FREN 101 and FREN 102. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (003795)

**FREN 202 Fourth-Semester French 4.0 Spring**

Prerequisites: FREN 201 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in FREN 101, FREN 102, and FREN 201. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (003794)

**FREN 211 Conversational French 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 102 or equivalent.  
Practice in the spoken language. Focus on comprehension, expression, and vocabulary-building. (003800)

**FREN 301 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (003805)

**FREN 302 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (003806)

**FREN 303 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 202 or equivalent.  
FREN 301 - FREN 303: Practice in speaking, writing, and reading. Focus on the development and accurate use of complex language patterns. These courses are non-sequential. (003807)

**FREN 310 Business French 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 202 or three years of high school French or equivalent.  
A survey of French business practices. Designed for students interested in international business or affairs, or who intend to travel for business in French-speaking countries. The course includes films, readings, and class discussion focusing on the economic, political, and social aspects of French culture. (003809)

**FREN 330 French Culture and Civilization 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 202 or equivalent.  
An introduction to French history and geography as well as French art, literature, philosophy, education, economy, social classes, and politics. (003812)

**FREN 340 Survey of French Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 301, FREN 302, or FREN 303.  
A survey of French literature with special emphasis on genres, literary techniques, and methods of analysis, early French literature to the French Revolution. (003815)

**FREN 345 Survey of French Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 301, FREN 302, or FREN 303.  
A survey of French literature with special emphasis on genres, literary techniques, and methods of analysis, Romantic to Contemporary Period. (003816)

**FREN 399 Special Problems 1.0-3.0 Fa/Spr**

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (003825)

**FREN 420 French Linguistics 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Six units from FREN 301, FREN 302, or FREN 303.  
This course introduces students to the study of linguistics as it relates to French. Topics include the evolution of the language from Latin to modern French, as well as historical and contemporary states of the language as they relate to phonology, morphology, and semantics. Practical application of knowledge, and the improvement of students' pronunciation, are stressed. Taught in French. (003834)

**FREN 440 The French Theater 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 301, FREN 302, or FREN 303.  
Varying content may emphasize the historical development of the theater or may choose the work of a single author. (003826)

**FREN 445 Francophone Literatures and Societies 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: FREN 301, FREN 302, or FREN 303.  
This course involves study of literature and society in Francophone Africa from the Maghreb (Morocco, Tunisia, Algeria) through Senegal and West Africa to Madagascar and the Reunion Island, New France (Quebec), the French Caribbean, the South Pacific (Tahiti), and Southeast Asia (Vietnam, Cambodia). (003828)

**FREN 450 The Seventeenth Century 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Six units from FREN 301, FREN 302, or FREN 303; FREN 340 or FREN 345.  
Study of the baroque and classic periods, including the waning of the seventeenth century. Major focus on theater. (003817)

**FREN 455 The Eighteenth Century 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Six units from FREN 301, FREN 302, FREN 303; FREN 340 or FREN 345.  
Study of the important trends of the period as seen through representative novels and plays. (003818)

**FREN 460 The Nineteenth Century 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Six units from FREN 301, FREN 302, FREN 303; FREN 340 or FREN 345.  
Study of the various literary movements across the century (romanticism, Parnasse, realism, naturalism, symbolism) in both prose and poetry. (003819)

**FREN 465 The Twentieth Century 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Six units from FREN 301, FREN 302, FREN 303; FREN 340 or FREN 345.  
Varying content may include writers of prose, poetry, and theater and literary movements such as surrealism, existentialism, the New Novel, and feminism. (003820)

**FREN 480 French Cinema 3.0 Inquire**

An introduction to French cinema as a narrative form, with emphasis on key films and directors from various periods of French film history. The class is taught in English. All films have English subtitles. (003813)

**FREN 497 Writing Proficiency 1.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ENGL 130 (or its equivalent) with a grade of C- or higher; upper-division standing; to be taken concurrently with another upper-division French literature course.  
Writing essays in English on French literature. Purpose is to ensure ability to write correct English in a style suitable to general essay writing. This is a writing proficiency, WP, course; a grade of C- or better certifies writing proficiency for majors. (003823)

**FREN 499H Senior Honors Thesis 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: Six units in FREN 301, FREN 302, FREN 303; 12 other upper-division French units; a grade-point average in the top 5% of French majors; an interview; faculty permission.  
Intensive study of scholarly approaches to problems in French language, literature or culture and training in the use of secondary sources to back up original ideas, leading to the production and public presentation of a scholarly project involving substantial research and earning a grade of B or higher for the designation of Honors in the Major. To be taken under faculty supervision for a total of six units in consecutive semesters. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. (003847)

## German Course Offerings

**GERM 101 First-Semester German 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to German language and culture. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing German. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (004199)

**GERM 102 Second-Semester German 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: GERM 101 or equivalent.  
Continuation of GERM 101. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing German. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (004201)

**GERM 199 Special Problems 1.0–3.0 Fa/Spr**

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0–3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (020496)

**GERM 201 Third-Semester German 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: GERM 102 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in GERM 101 and GERM 102. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (004204)

**GERM 202 Fourth-Semester German 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: GERM 201 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in GERM 101, GERM 102, and GERM 201. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (004203)

**GERM 211 Conversational German 3.0 Fall**

Prerequisites: GERM 102 or equivalent. Should be taken concurrently with GERM 201 or GERM 202.  
Intensive practice in the spoken language with the objectives of developing fluency and increasing vocabulary through the study of cultural topics. (004208)

**GERM 212 Conversational German 3.0 Spring**

Prerequisites: GERM 102 or equivalent.  
Further intensive practice in the spoken language. May be taken before or after GERM 211. (004209)

**GERM 299 Special Problems 1.0–3.0 Inquire**

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0–3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (020586)

**GERM 301 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (004211)

**GERM 302 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (004212)

**GERM 303 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
GERM 301 - GERM 303: Review of grammar and syntax; vocabulary-building practice in conversation; synopses of short stories and compositions in German. Emphasis on accuracy in grammar and expression. These courses are non-sequential. (004213)

**GERM 325 Linguistics of Modern German 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
Study and practice of the phonology, morphology, and syntax of modern German. Contrastive analysis of the sounds of German and English. (004215)

**GERM 330 German Culture and Civilization 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
A survey of some of the great figures and periods of German art, literature, music, and public life which have made significant contributions to the development of civilization in German-speaking countries. (004216)

**GERM 335 Sustainability, Technology, and Utopia in German Culture 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 201 OR GERM 202  
This course focuses on ecological developments in German history and culture; it emphasizes the historical use of natural energy resources such as wind, water, and their contemporary use, and in addition to these the renewable energy of sun and biomass; the course analyzes the German forest as a significant place in German mythology, history, and contemporary culture; juxtaposed are such 20th century developments as architecture and design of the Bauhaus with ecological ways of architecture and design. Utopian concepts and their readings pertaining to sustainability and technology are discussed. (020677)

**GERM 340 Introduction to German Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
An introduction to selected works of prose, lyric, and drama. Includes early German literature through the eighteenth century. (004217)

**GERM 345 Introduction to German Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
An introduction to selected works of prose, lyric, and drama. Includes nineteenth- and twentieth-century German literature. (004218)

**GERM 399 Special Problems 1.0–3.0 Inquire**

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0–3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (004222)

**GERM 440 The German Theater 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 201 or GERM 202.  
A survey of the history of German theater from the Middle Ages to the present; including Passionsspiele, Wanderbuhne, the social position of actors; the development of regional theaters, the idea of a national theater and that of East and West Germany. However, varying content may emphasize the historical development of the theater or may choose a specific period or the work of a single author. (020680)

**GERM 455 German Classicism 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
Primary emphasis on the classical works of Schiller and Goethe, with attention given as well to Lessing and the Sturm und Drang movement as precursors of the period. (004225)

**GERM 460 German Romanticism 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
Study of prose and lyric works of Novalis, Tieck, Arnim, Brentano, Hoffmann, Eichendorff, and other figures of the Romantic Period. Analysis of literary and intellectual trends within the period. (004226)

**GERM 465 Nineteenth-Century German Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
A survey of the development of prose, drama, and lyric after Goethe and the Romantics to the twentieth century, including representative authors of poetic realism and naturalism. (004228)

**GERM 470 Twentieth-Century German Literature Before World War II 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
Readings in prose, drama, and lyric of the Expressionists, Rilke, Mann, Hesse, Kafka, Brecht, and others. (004229)

**GERM 472 Twentieth-Century German Literature After World War II 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: GERM 202 or equivalent.  
Study of ideas and trends in the novel, drama, and poetry of Bachmann, Böll, Dürrenmatt, Frisch, Grass, Hochhuth, Jelinek, Weiss, Wolf, and other contemporary authors. (004230)

**GERM 482 Weimar Cinema: From Caligari to Hitler 3.0 Inquire**

Class taught in English. All films have English subtitles. Historical survey of film classics from the Expressionist cinema, the Weimar Republic, and the Third Reich, with an introduction to the main currents in film aesthetics and theory from Kracauer to contemporary feminist film theories. Readings of major authors on films, including Brecht, Eisner, and Kracauer. Screening of films by Murnau, Lang, and von Sternberg. (004223)

**GERM 484 The New German Cinema 3.0 Inquire**

Class taught in English. All films have English subtitles. Historical survey of representative films from the post-war era, the New German, and feminist cinema, including study of their cultural and social significance, with a component of significant film aesthetics and theories from Kluge to contemporary feminist film theories. (004224)

**GERM 486 Contemporary German Cinema 3.0 Inquire**

Class is taught in English; films in German with English subtitles. A historical survey of representative films and cinema cultures of Austria and Switzerland, and of the former two German states, East and West Germany from the 1980's to the present; including study of their cultural and social significance with a component of aesthetic changes in united Germany's cinematic culture after 1990, and a representation of Germany's multicultural society. (020681)

**GERM 497 Writing Proficiency 1.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ENGL 130 (or its equivalent) with a grade of C- or higher; upper-division standing.

Writing essays in English on German literature and/or practice in translation from German to English. Ordinarily taken in conjunction with another upper-division German course. Purpose is to ensure ability to write correct English in a style suitable to general essay writing. This is a writing proficiency, WP, course; a grade of C- or better certifies writing proficiency for majors. (004220)

**Greek Course Offerings**

**GREK 101 First-Semester Greek 4.0 Inquire**

Introduction to the ancient Greek language and culture. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of reading, pronunciation, and composition of ancient Greek. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020745)

**GREK 102 Second-Semester Greek 4.0 Inquire**

Continuation of GREK 101. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of reading, pronunciation, and composition of ancient Greek. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (020746)

**Hebrew Course Offerings**

**HBRW 101 First-Semester Hebrew 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to basic Hebrew language and Jewish culture. Emphasis of the course is on speaking and listening. This is an approved General Education course. (004419)

**HBRW 101A Beginning Hebrew I 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to the Modern Hebrew language and culture. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Modern Hebrew. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (020724)

**HBRW 102 Second-Semester Hebrew 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: HBRW 101.  
Continuation of basic Hebrew language and Jewish culture, with emphasis on speaking and listening. This is an approved General Education course. (004420)

**HBRW 102A Beginning Hebrew II 4.0 Spring**

Continuation of HBRW 101A. Emphasis is on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Modern Hebrew. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (020725)

**HBRW 103 Third-Semester Hebrew 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: HBRW 102.  
Continuation of HBRW 102 in the self-instructional format. Emphasis on developing reading and writing. (004421)

**HBRW 104 Fourth-Semester Hebrew 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: HBRW 103.  
Continuation of HBRW 103 in the self-instructional format. Further development of reading and writing. (004422)

**.Italian Course Offerings**

**ITAL 101 First-Semester Italian 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Introduction to Italian language and culture. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Italian. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005088)

**ITAL 102 Second-Semester Italian 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ITAL 101 or equivalent.  
Continuation of ITAL 101. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Italian. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005090)

**ITAL 201 Third-Semester Italian 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ITAL 102 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in ITAL 101 and ITAL 102. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005093)

**ITAL 202 Fourth-Semester Italian 4.0 Fa/Spr**

Prerequisites: ITAL 201 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in ITAL 101, ITAL 102, and ITAL 201. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005092)

**ITAL 211 Italian Conversation and Phonetics 3.0 Fa/Spr**

Intensive training in oral practice, aiming at correct pronunciation. Conversation designed to develop self-expression and to increase vocabulary. (005097)

**ITAL 301 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (005100)

**ITAL 302 Composition and Conversation 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
ITAL 301 and ITAL 302: Emphasis on fluency and development of literary style; composition in the Italian language; review of grammar and syntax. These courses are non-sequential. (005101)

**ITAL 320 Advanced Italian Conversation and Phonology 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202, ITAL 211 or equivalent.  
Continued intensive practice in the spoken language. Practice and review of phonetics, phonology, morphology, and syntactics as they apply to the learning and teaching of Italian. (005102)

**ITAL 330 Italian Culture and Civilization 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
Survey of some of the greatest figures in literature, philosophy, science, art, music, politics, geography, and history of Italy. (005103)

**ITAL 335 Italy Today 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 201 or faculty permission.  
Through prose, poetry, film, music, art, and historical accounts, this course surveys contemporary Italian social, political, and cultural life from the fall of Fascism to the present. (020849)

**ITAL 340 Masters of Italian Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
Study of the most important writers of Italian literature from Dante to modern times. Emphasis on genre, textual analysis, and interpretation. Readings, discussions, and reports. (005104)

**ITAL 345 Survey of Italian Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
The main literary and intellectual trends from Dante to the eighteenth century. Readings, discussions, and reports. (005106)

**ITAL 346 Survey of Italian Literature 3.0 Inquire**

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
The main literary trends from the eighteenth century to the present. Readings, discussions, and reports. (005107)

**ITAL 360 The Italian Renaissance and Its Influence on Western Civilization 3.0 Fa/Spr**

A study of the major events in fifteenth- and sixteenth-century Italy and their influence upon other European countries. Taught in English. This is an approved General Education course. (005108)

**ITAL 399 Special Problems 1.0–3.0 Fa/Spr**

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0–3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (005110)

**ITAL 430 Italian American Studies 3.0 Inquire**

This course is the study of the arrival, presence, and contributions of the Italian immigrants in the Americas, especially in the United States and California. The course emphasizes the complex dynamics of cultural assimilation and ethnic differentiation of Italian immigrants in the adopted countries. (005115)

### ITAL 435 Cinematic Representations 3.0 Inquire

Course is taught in English. The goal of this course is to explore to what extent recent films and televised series have been successful in rescuing Italian/Americans from negative ethnic typification. (020851)

### ITAL 441 Development of Italian Drama 3.0 Inquire

ITAL 440 - ITAL 441: History of the Italian drama from the beginning to the twentieth century. Will include the Commedia dell'Arte and its influence on Western drama, and the survey of operatic authors. (005114)

### ITAL 460 Proseminar in Literary Figures and Problems 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (005116)

### ITAL 461 Proseminar in Literary Figures and Problems 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (005117)

### ITAL 462 Proseminar in Literary Figures and Problems 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
See description below. (005118)

### ITAL 463 Proseminar in Literary Figures and Problems 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: ITAL 202 or equivalent.  
ITAL 460 - ITAL 463: Study of a major figure, genre, movement, or period in Italian letters. (005119)

### ITAL 482 Italian Cinema - General History, Genres, and Trends 3.0 Inquire

The Italian Cinema as a creative art form has had a profound and lasting impact on world cinematography. The course will include Italian film history and the study of major trends and techniques. The relationship of the cinema to socio-political, economic, and literary events in Italy and the world will be studied: Neorealism, The Felliniesque, Spaghetti Western, Commedia all'Italiana, and more recent trends. The class is taught in English and all films have English subtitles. (005111)

### ITAL 483 Italian Cinema - Great Film Directors 3.0 Inquire

Consists of a series of related in-depth monographic studies of such great film directors as De Sica, Visconti, Rossellini, Fellini, Antonioni, Bertolucci, Pasolini, the Tavianis, and Scola. The class is taught in English and all films have English subtitles. (005112)

## Japanese Course Offerings

### JAPN 101 First-Semester Japanese 4.0 Fa/Spr

Introduction to the Japanese language and culture. Emphasis on the development of fundamental skills in listening, speaking, reading, and writing with clear understanding of basic sentence structures. Acquisition of Hiragana and Katakana characters (phonetic symbols). 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005334)

### JAPN 102 Second-Semester Japanese 4.0 Fa/Spr

Prerequisites: JAPN 101 or faculty permission.  
Continuation of JAPN 101. Special attention to different verb forms and essential auxiliary expressions. Appropriate language use in a variety of social settings. Acquisition of 110 Kanji characters (ideographic symbols). 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005335)

### JAPN 201 Third-Semester Japanese 4.0 Fa/Spr

Prerequisites: JAPN 102 or faculty permission.  
Review of major grammatical structures and further development of the student's cultural awareness and proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Japanese. Special attention to logical discourse development. Acquisition of 200 Kanji characters (ideographic symbols). 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005336)

### JAPN 202 Fourth-Semester Japanese 4.0 Fa/Spr

Prerequisites: JAPN 201 or faculty permission.  
Continuation of review of major grammatical structures and further development of the student's cultural awareness and proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Japanese. Special attention to refining and expanding discourse. Acquisition of 300 Kanji characters (ideographic symbols). 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (005337)

### JAPN 301 Advanced Writing and Reading 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: JAPN 201.  
This course provides intensive training in writing and reading Kanji characters in context. A variety of reading materials are reviewed, such as newspapers, magazines, literature, business correspondence, etc. Writing exercises focus on increasing use of Kanji characters. (020194)

### JAPN 305 Conversational Japanese 3.0 Inquire

Practice of conversational patterns in a casual format aiming at improving fluency in day-to-day interactions with native Japanese speakers. In an attempt to provide real conversational settings, there are hands-on activities such as singing, cooking, observing a tea ceremony, watching Japanese television programs, etc. (020181)

### JAPN 320 Japanese Linguistics 3.0 Inquire

This course first explores different approaches to grammar, such as Case Grammar, Relational Grammar, Transformational Grammar, etc. Students then examine syntax, phonetics, semantics, morphology, and the sociolinguistic aspect of the Japanese language. (020195)

### JAPN 330 Japanese Culture and Civilization 3.0 Inquire

An introduction to Japanese history and geography, as well as Japanese art forms, literature, philosophy, education, economy, customs, language, and politics. Course also includes a comparison of Japanese and American organizational theories. This is an approved Global Cultures course. (000993)

### JAPN 348 Japanese Lyric Poetry 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: JAPN 202  
This course examines the socio-historic context of Japanese rhythm and poetic features as well as the literary significance of lyrics. Students are encouraged to pursue perfect pronunciation and knowledge (meaning, history, composer, singer, lyricist, etc.) behind the lyrics. Students are required to memorize ten different lyric poems. (020575)

### JAPN 381 Japan in Film 3.0 Inquire

This course is taught in English. It examines a variety of Japanese films involving the following cultural themes: roles of men and women, society, history, politics, education, theater, sports, music, industry, comedy, etc. In the process, the students examine and analyze the myths and realities of Japanese people as portrayed in the films. Discussions are designed to increase students' awareness of intercultural communication, to foster their preparedness for functioning in the complex order of Japanese society. All films have English subtitles. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. (020182)

### JAPN 425 Japanese Teaching Methodologies 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: JAPN 202 or faculty permission.  
This course is for students who have attained an advanced level of fluency in Japanese or are native speakers of Japanese. While this course explores a variety of teaching methodologies, students analyze the gap between syntax and semantics to formulate concise explanations and develop skills best suited for teaching Japanese to non-native learners. 1.0 hours lecture, 6.0 hours supervision. (020183)

### JAPN 489 Internship 1.0-3.0 Fa/Spr

This internship is offered for 1.0-3.0 units. Students must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 15.0 units. (020594)

### LATN 101 First-Semester Latin 4.0 Fa/Spr

**SPAN 101 First-Semester Spanish 4.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 101 is not available for credit to students with two or more years of Spanish within the last three years.  
Introduction to Spanish language and culture. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Spanish. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (009113)

**SPAN 102 Second-Semester Spanish 4.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 101 or equivalent.  
Continuation of SPAN 101. Emphasis on the fundamental skills of understanding, speaking, reading, and writing Spanish. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (009118)

**SPAN 200 Conversational Spanish 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 102 or equivalent. May be taken concurrently with SPAN 201 or SPAN 202.  
Intensive practice in the spoken language with the objectives of developing fluency and increasing vocabulary through the study of cultural topics. (009129)

**SPAN 201 Third-Semester Spanish 4.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 102 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in SPAN 101 and SPAN 102. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (009121)

**SPAN 201N Spanish for Spanish Speakers 4.0 Fall**  
Prerequisites: Faculty permission.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills possessed by speakers of Spanish who have not studied the language formally. This course includes composition and reading. Particular focus on the Mexican-American/Latino experience. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. (009123)

**SPAN 202 Fourth-Semester Spanish 4.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 201 or equivalent.  
Reviewing and expanding of language skills and cultural concepts introduced in SPAN 101, SPAN 102, and SPAN 201. This course includes composition and reading. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (009120)

**SPAN 202N Spanish for Spanish Speakers 4.0 Spring**

Prerequisites: Faculty permission.  
Further reviewing and expanding of language skills possessed by speakers of Spanish who have not studied the language formally. Builds on topics studied in SPAN 201N. This course includes composition and reading. Particular focus on the Mexican-American/Latino experience. 2.0 hours activity, 3.0 hours discussion. This is an approved General Education course. (009126)

**SPAN 203 Reading and Conversation 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 201. May be taken concurrently with SPAN 202.  
Reading practice and discussions designed to further acquaint the student with Hispanic culture and to improve comprehension and vocabulary in preparation for upper-division courses. (009131)

**SPAN 301 Grammar and Composition 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 202 or equivalent. May be taken concurrently with SPAN 321 and/or SPAN 303.  
Intensive review of grammar and its application in composition. This course or its equivalent is a prerequisite for all other upper-division courses. Required of all majors and minors. (009137)

**SPAN 302 Reading and Composition 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 301.  
Emphasis on fluency, style, and syntax. Required of all majors and minors. (009139)

**SPAN 303 Advanced Oral Expression 3.0 Spring**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 202 or equivalent. May be taken concurrently with SPAN 301 and/or SPAN 321.  
Intensive practice in the spoken language at an advanced level of proficiency. Guided conversations and discussions, debates, and speeches. Enrollment will be limited. Native speakers should consult with instructor before enrolling. (009153)

**SPAN 320 Introduction to Spanish Linguistics 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 301.  
A survey of the fields of general linguistics. Theory and practice of language analysis. Relationship between language and culture. Principles of phonology, morphology, and syntax of Spanish language. (009142)

**SPAN 321 Spanish Phonology 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 202 or equivalent. May be taken concurrently with SPAN 301 and/or SPAN 303.  
Phonology (phonetics and phonemics), linguistic geography, and related areas as they apply to the learning and teaching of Spanish. (009150)

**SPAN 331 Spanish Culture and Civilization 3.0 Fall**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 301 or faculty permission.  
Introduction to the historical and cultural heritage of Spain, to selected figures in the arts and public life, and to the ways and traditions of Spaniards today. Readings, reports, and discussion. (009152)

**SPAN 332 Latin American Culture and Civilization 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 301 or faculty permission.  
A survey of the cultural, social, economic, and political heritage of Latin America and its evolution into contemporary Latin American society. (009155)

**SPAN 341 Introduction to Latin American Literature 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 301.  
Introduces students to the study of Hispanic literature and culture, and develops their skills in language comprehension and analysis of prose, poetry, and drama. The works studied will be short stories, full-length plays, and Hispanic-American narrative and lyric poetry. SPAN 341 and SPAN 342 are required of all majors and count as electives for the minor. Either fulfills the prerequisite for all other upper-division literature courses. (009140)

**SPAN 342 Introduction to Spanish Peninsular Literature 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
Prerequisites: SPAN 301.  
Introduces students to the study of Hispanic literature and culture, and develops their skills in language comprehension and analysis of prose, poetry, and drama. Works studied will be the novel, one-act plays, and Peninsular Spanish narrative and lyric poetry. SPAN 342 is required of all majors and fulfills the prerequisite for all other upper-division literature courses. (009141)

**SPAN 354 Chicano Literature 3.0 Fa/Spr**  
A study of the Chicano people as reflected in selected films and literature. Reading, discussions, and reports will be in English. This is a service course for non-majors and not elective for a BA degree or minor in Spanish. This is an approved General Education course. This is an approved US Diversity course. This course is also offered as CHST 354. (001977)

## Foreign Languages and Literatures

### SPAN 371 Workshop in Hispanic Children's Literature 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301 or faculty permission.

The student will explore the relationship between literature and culture. Oral expression will be enhanced through reading and individual and class projects. Practical implementation of knowledge through the interpretation of stories, creation of short plays and original skits for presentation at local elementary schools that have a substantial Hispanic enrollment. (009154)

### SPAN 398 Special Topics 1.0-3.0 Inquire

This course is for special topics offered for 1.0-3.0 units. Typically the topic is offered on a one-time-only basis and may vary from term to term and be different for different sections. See the Class Schedule for the specific topic being offered. (009157)

### SPAN 399 Special Problems 1.0-3.0 Inquire

This course is an independent study of special problems offered for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. Credit/no credit grading only. (009158)

### SPAN 425 Spanish Teaching Methodologies 3.0 Spring

Prerequisites: SPAN 301, SPAN 320.

This is a senior-level Spanish course that introduces students to current theories of foreign language learning and implications of key research for classroom practice. Students learn strategies for teaching Spanish, including the utilization of appropriate technology. In addition to lecture and discussion, students complete the Early Field Experience hours required for entry to a credential program. 2.0 hours lecture, 3.0 hours clinical. (020141)

### SPAN 441 Hispanic Short Story 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Study of leading short story writers from Spain and Latin America, with background readings and reports on representative authors. Emphasis on contemporary works. (009159)

### SPAN 442 Hispanic Theater 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Readings, discussions, reports, and oral interpretation of major dramatic works of Latin America and Spain. (009161)

### SPAN 443 Hispanic Novel 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Analysis of representative novels from Latin America and Spain. (009167)

### SPAN 444 Hispanic Poetry 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Study of the leading poets of Spain and Latin America. (009172)

### SPAN 451 Literature of Mexico 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Readings and reports on literature of Mexico from pre-Columbian to contemporary literature. (009168)

### SPAN 452 Viewing the Hispanic Caribbean 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301, SPAN 302; either SPAN 341 or SPAN 342 (may be taken concurrently).

Critical analysis of literature and culture of the Spanish-speaking Caribbean, utilizing reading, discussion, oral reports, and written projects. (009170)

### SPAN 454 Chicano Literature 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

A study of the Chicano people as reflected in selected films and literature. Discussions will be in Spanish, readings in English and Spanish, reports in Spanish. This course is also offered as CHST 454. (001984)

### SPAN 461 Don Quixote 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Cervantes' novel and his amiable madman in the larger context of literature and culture. Commentary on contemporary history, society, and politics. (009165)

### SPAN 470H Spanish Honors Seminar 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301, SPAN 302 with a grade of B or higher; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; three units of SPAN 321 or higher level. Minimum GPA in major of 3.5. Open only to students in the top 5 percent of majors in the program. Faculty permission. A seminar for Honors students. The course focuses on major literary periods and authors from Latin America and Spain in conjunction with literary criticism and theory. Initial work on writing the Honors thesis. (015816)

### SPAN 471 Women and Literature in the Hispanic World 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Women in Spanish-speaking society. An approach to culture via a study of women as literary subjects and as writers. The idealization and reality of their existence as reflected through Spanish and Latin American literature. (009182)

### SPAN 472 Oral and Written Traditions of the Spanish Speaking World 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Study of the diverse oral and written traditions that both predate and coexist with the literary tradition in Spanish. Topics may include oral narrative such as legends, myths, proverbs, religious beliefs; oral practices in verse such as the troubadour tradition, anonymous epic poetry, popular songs and ballads, and corridos; and written practices such as testimonies, autobiographies, and epistles. (009178)

### SPAN 481 Film and Literature in Spain and Latin America 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 301; SPAN 341 or SPAN 342; or faculty permission.

Students will consider the elements that constitute literary and cinematic masterpieces by examining films based on a variety of texts: epic poetry, drama, short story, legend, novel, zarzuela, and film script. The films will represent the cultural and linguistic diversity in areas of Spain and Latin America. Special fee required; see the Class Schedule. (009183)

### SPAN 489 Directed Field Experience in Spanish 1.0-3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: Recommended for majors and graduate students, some minors upon completion of SPAN 302 or equivalent or faculty permission.

This course is an internship offered for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. Provides students with the opportunity to develop their language proficiency in Spanish and enables them to use their language skills in on-the-job situations. Limited to majors, graduate students, and selected minors upon completion of SPAN 302. A maximum of 3 units may be counted toward the major. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 15.0 units. (009184)

### SPAN 497 Spanish Subject Matter Assessment and Writing Proficiency 1.0 Fa/Spr

Prerequisites: ENGL 130 (or its equivalent) with a grade of C- or higher; upper-division standing. To be taken concurrently with any upper-division Spanish course.

The course includes two components, the Spanish Subject Matter Assessment Exam and the Writing Proficiency Research Paper. The comprehensive exam covers Spanish language, Spanish linguistics, and Spanish and Latin American literature and culture. The Writing Proficiency Research Paper is an investigative/analytical essay in English on a major work of Hispanic literature. Students show mastery of the major areas of study in Spanish as well as the ability to investigate, plan and write essays using correct English and in a style suitable to literary analysis. This is a writing proficiency, WP, course; a grade of C- or better certifies writing proficiency for majors. (009156)

### SPAN 499H Spanish Honors Thesis 3.0 Inquire

Prerequisites: SPAN 470H with a grade of B or higher, faculty permission.

Independent Study. Completion of Honors thesis under the direction of assigned Spanish faculty. The thesis, based on studies begun in SPAN 470H, requires original work beyond that normally required in undergraduate work. Students present the thesis in a public lecture. (015815)

### SPAN 689 Internship 1.0-3.0 Inquire

This course is an internship offered for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. (009196)

### SPAN 697 Independent Study 1.0-3.0 Inquire

This course is a graduate-level independent study offered for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. (009199)

### SPAN 698 Special Topic 1.0-3.0 Inquire

This course is a special topic offered for 1.0-3.0 units. Typically the topic is offered on a one-time-only basis and will vary from term to term and be different for different sections. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 3.0 units. (009198)

### SPAN 699T Master's Thesis 1.0-6.0 Inquire

This course is offered as for 1.0-3.0 units. You must register directly with a supervising faculty member. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 6.0 units. (009203)
