



## SPED 636: Advanced Curriculum Content Mild/Moderate Disabilities Research Guide

This guide was created to assist you in locating sources for your literature review project, but it will also be useful for researching other topics in the field of Education. ### Databases recommended for Education topics include:

**ERIC** (Educational Resources Information Center) - includes abstracts of journal articles and ERIC documents (conference papers, teacher developed materials and other unpublished information), and full-text ERIC Digests. Eric is the largest world's largest Education database.

*Note: the library subscribes to an expanded version of ERIC which contains considerably more full-text than does the free web version. Use the library link to access the library's version of ERIC via proxy-server. From off-campus you'll be prompted to use your CSU Portal login. Another benefit of using the library's version is the 'Find-It' links. When the full-text is unavailable in the ERIC database but available elsewhere in the library (electronically in another database, or via print subscription) a 'Find It' link will quickly and easily lead you to it.*

**Academic Search** – a generic database that contains some information in almost every academic field, it does not delve deeply into any specific topic. Still what it contains is quality information and it is often a good place to begin your research. It contains articles from Academic Journals, Magazines, Newspapers and Books/Monographs, and Educational Reports and results can easily be filtered for these specific formats.

**Ingenta** – a database of more than 11 million citations from over 20,000 journals. To search the gateway without signing in, type a keyword in the search box. After an initial keyword search has been completed, you'll be able to switch to Advanced Search to further refine your search (link located on right-side menu). Note: this is primarily a database of citations, however some full-text is available. The following icons signify full-text accessibility, look for them: **F**- Free content **S**- Subscribed Content **T**- Free Trial Content

**PsycINFO** – a database of information on psychology and related disciplines including Education. It contains abstracts for journal articles, books, book chapters, and dissertations ... and some full-text. 'Find-It' links will connect you to full-text when available electronically other databases or to our library catalog if we have a print subscription to the journal.

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**NEW Education Databases** – links to the following new databases will soon be added to the Education Resources page ... look for them! In the meantime they may be accessed from our Quick Links to Databases A-Z <http://www.csuchico.edu/lref/guides/rbn/index.htm>

**Blackwell Synergy** – a collection of 746 journals covering a broad range of disciplines including science, technology, medicine, business, and the humanities.

**Sage Journals Online** – a collection of 419 journals published by Sage covering a broad range of disciplines including science, technology, medicine, business, and the humanities.

**JSTOR** – contains complete full-text back files (except for the last five years) of scholarly journals in such areas as sociology, history, economics, political science, mathematics, general sciences, language, literature and education.

**SpringerLink** – a collection offering more than 1,100 full-text scientific, technical, and medical journals. Includes such journals as: Journal of Science Teacher Education, Journal of Behavioral Education, Advances in Health Sciences Education, Early Childhood Education Journal, Innovative Higher Education, and Journal of Science Education & Technology, etc.

### **Google Scholar**

Google Scholar has been a great discovery tool for scholarly literature since its inception. Until recently, however, it was often frustrating to use because very little free full-text was available. But now there's good news to announce! CSUC has partnered with Google Scholar and you may now link directly from your Scholar results to full-text articles in our library collection. If you're using a computer on-campus, or if you login from home using a Google Scholar link on our library website ... your Scholar preferences are already selected for you and you'll just need to look for the Find-It @ Chico link on your Scholar results. If you go to Scholar directly from an off-campus computer you will need to add this link in Scholar preferences. This is easy to do and once saved it will remain saved until you deselect it.

#### **Three easy ways to access Google Scholar:**

Just follow the path: more > even more > Google Scholar  
(this takes slightly longer ... but if you've forgotten Scholar's URL it's another way to get there. Plus, you can see a complete list of Google's specialized databases and products this way.)

Select "G" in Databases A-Z, then Google Scholar; or simply scroll down to our Quick Links to Databases A-Z and select Google Scholar. (The Find-It @ Chico link will be set up for you automatically if you access Scholar this way.)

#### **Setting up the Find-It @ Chico link**

If you'd like to go to Google Scholar directly using your off-campus computer, just follow these instructions to set up the 'Find-It' link. Open Scholar Preferences (link next to Google Scholar basic search box), scroll to Library Links section, type CSU and click Find Library. Select CSU, Chico from the list and save preferences at either top or bottom of screen. Now you're ready to search. Find-It @ Chico links will appear if the source title is owned by Meriam Library (note: this does not necessarily mean we own the specific issue needed, unfortunately the linkage is not that sophisticated yet. (Still this is a big improvement ... and a true time & money saver!))

**Google Directory** <http://www.google.com/dirhp> - websites (selected by humans) and organized by topic into categories.

Dive into the categories [e.g. PATH: Reference > Education > Special Education > (Learning Disabilities, Resources & Guides, Lesson Plans, etc.) OR search by keyword. Note: you can search the entire directory or limit search to a specific category (e.g. search only in Special Education). Excellent way to locate good credible websites.

## Meriam Library FAQ's

### **Q. Can I access library resources from home?**

A. Yes. A CSUC Portal account is all that is needed to access the CSUC databases and eBooks. You need to open these resources using the links on the library's website and enter the databases via proxy-server, you will login using Portal name & password when prompted. A second way to enter is to go into your Portal Account first, then enter the library website using the library link. (However: Never go directly to the database site as you will circumvent the proxy ... you can only enter through the library's links.) ### **Q. How do I find books in the Chico State Library?**

A. Use the Library Catalog. From the Books tab on the Education Resources page <http://www.csuchico.edu/lref/guides/rbs/educ.htm> open the Library Catalog. (or use the Books link, upper-left corner of the ReSEARCH Station: <http://www.csuchico.edu/library/>) Search by keyword(s) using Boolean operators. Notice you can change the search fields (keyword anywhere, keyword title, keyword subject, etc.) Note: If you have a citation and are searching for a specific book by title and/or author it is often easier to switch to an 'Author/Title/Subject' search using the tab at the top of the page. Remember, however, search terms here must appear in the exact order ... always begin title search with first words of complete title, and always enter author's last name first. When you find a book you'd like, check the status to make sure the book is not checked out ... then jot down the complete call# AND collection. Items may have the same call number but be located in different collections (main, folio, circulation and reserve, media and microforms, reference, popular, periodicals, theses, etc.) Call # alone is not sufficient.

### **Q. How do I find a Chico State thesis?**

A. Open the Library Catalog (as described above). Search as above ... but scroll down to Limiting Fields. Use the arrow to scroll to & select 'thesis', press submit. You can also BROWSE the thesis shelves on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor. Special Education theses will have call numbers beginning with LB or LC.

### **Q. When I'm searching a database how do I know if the library has the articles I want?**

A. When you're in the database look for:

- links to html or PDF or "linked full text". They will take you directly to the article.
- Or, use the "Find It" links. They open the Citation Station which tells you where the full-text article is located *if we own it*. It will also link you directly to the full-text if we own it electronically in another database. Simply click the Go icon next to the database.
- If we subscribe to the journal in print the Citation Station links you to the Library Catalog and you will need to check the 'Chico Has' field (3<sup>rd</sup> from top) for the date range to see if we have the issue needed.

### **Q. What if I really need the article and you don't have it?**

A. If we don't own the journal you will see an Interlibrary Loan link in the Citation Station and you may request the article using this link. The citation information will automatically be transferred to the ILL request form using this link. All articles are now loaned electronically and you may access them via your Interlibrary Loan account. This can all be done from home and you will not need to come to the library. Note: you will need to complete an ILL profile the first time you request an article. This creates your ILL account. More info on InterLibrary Loans: <http://www.csuchico.edu/library/ill/ill.html>

**Q. If I have a citation from a source other than a database, how do I find it?**

A. Use the Periodicals List. PATH: ReSEARCH Station > Periodical's List (upper left menu). Search for the source journal ... not the article title. Note: the Periodicals List and 'Find It' connect to the same database of items. When the Citation Station opens ... click on the 'Go' icons to connect to the database. You may try plugging the journal info (issue, citation, volume, issue, etc.) into the Citation Station before clicking go. This only works sometimes ... but when it does it will take you directly to your article. When it doesn't work, try connecting without the specific info ... this will open the Journal in the database and you will need to then to search within that publication for the exact issue and article.

**Q. How do I search for books the CSUC library doesn't have?**

A. Select ReSEARCH Station / Library Catalogs <http://www.csuchico.edu/library/books.htm>  
Here you'll be able to search other library catalogs: the CSU libraries catalog (Pharos), the UC libraries catalog (Melvyl), the Butte County Library, and the Library of Congress. You may order books via Interlibrary Loan but they will need to be picked up and returned to the CSUC library. If you do not live locally, it may be more convenient to order your ILL through your own home library. Note: if you have a citation for a book we do not own and you wish to order through ILL you do not need to locate it in another library. Just complete the ILL form as completely as possible (title, author, edition, year or publication, publisher, etc.) and we'll find it for you. **Q. Is there a way to save my searches?**

A. Yes, the EBSCOHost (the umbrella company for ERIC, Academic Search, and PsycINFO) offers a free MyEBSCOHost account. If you login to this account you may save your documents as well as your searches. You may also create an alert for newly published documents matching your search query.

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## SEARCHING ERIC

Your students are having trouble with their reading comprehension and you've specifically pinpointed the problem is that they are not grasping the "main idea" of the selections they are reading. You want to find articles on how to teach 'main idea'.



### Sample Search:

Find: "Main idea"                      Select a Field (optional)

**AND** "special education"              Select a Field (optional)

17 results - sorted by date (may be resorted by relevance, author, or source)

Results may be narrowed by subject using links suggested on left side of screen. Selecting 'Reading Instruction' narrows list to 5 results. Narrowing it again by selecting 'Reading Strategies' narrows it to 3 results, including:

This article actually was at the top of our list before we narrowed it the last time ... but I wanted to demonstrate how the list could be narrowed multiple times if necessary.

You may want to browse the ERIC Thesaurus for correct subject headings. Click 'Thesaurus' (on green bar across top) to open. The Thesaurus opens and is located within the green border beneath the ERIC search box. Type 'Reading Comprehension' in the 'Browse for' box (select 'term contains') & click browse. The top result is Reading Comprehension & it is an active link. Click it to divide it into smaller sub-categories. See examples of Broader Terms and Related Terms. These, too, are active links and may be further divided OR you may select the subject heading as is and add it to your search. Select 'Directed Reading Activity' and add. Note: that this was input in your search box at the top with the initials DE in front (this stands for Descriptor which is ERIC's name for subject headings). Now click search and you should retrieve 392 results. We're back to our advanced search screen and we may further modify our search by adding additional keywords and/or descriptors. Add AND: "special education" on second line. We're now down to 6 results, but no full-text or FIND-IT buttons. These 6 citations are from the 1970's and 1980's and the library has a complete collection of older Eric docs (pre-1989) in our microfiche collection on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. They are filed by the ED number: (ED257046).
