

REGISTRATION INSTRUCTIONS FOR Nursing **Semester I** - FALL 2009

For the first semester, you will take only 2 nursing courses, totaling 6 units. The rest of your schedule should consist of any nursing co-requisites not yet completed. If you have finished all nursing co-requisites, you should register for upper division theme courses or any remaining general education courses you need. If you have completed all of these courses, you may register for just the 6 units, paying part-time tuition. If you are receiving financial aid you are usually required to enroll in 12 units.

For Nursing, sign up for:

NURS 282 **and** NURS 283.

Co-requisites are:

Child Development (CHLD 252)

Nutrition (NFSC 100)

Intro Psychology (PSYC 101)

Cultural Anthropology or Intro Sociology (ANTH 113 or SOCI 100)

If you have taken all the above courses, register for any remaining GE courses, such as US History, American Govt; Humanities, ethnic and nonwestern, or upper division themes.

Upper Division Theme Requirements for Nursing Majors

Nursing majors only have to take two upper division theme courses, not three. These two courses must be from the same theme. The theme course that nursing majors are exempted from represents the science requirement in each theme. Therefore, DO NOT take the following theme courses:

Theme C	-	PSSC 390
Theme D	-	BIOL 334/ GEOS 330/ GEOS 340
Theme E	-	(Not recommended—three courses required)*
Theme F	-	MCGS/NURS 326
Theme G	-	GEOS 370/ PSSC 392
Theme H	-	(Not recommended—three courses required)*
Theme I	-	LAST 351/351M
Theme J	-	(Not recommended—three courses required)*
Theme M	-	(Not recommended—three courses required)*
Theme N	-	PHYS 376; MATH 302
Theme O	-	HCSV/NURS/WMST 368
Theme R	-	(Not recommended—three courses required)*
Theme S	-	MATH 304
Theme T	-	BIOL 318/HCSV 363
Them U	-	GEOS 355

*Note: Five themes require three courses, even for high unit majors. Therefore, these themes are not recommended for nursing majors unless they opt to take three courses rather than two.
