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

I came to realize that TEK is a philosophy; it is a conscious choice to recognize and honor the interwoven relationships that exist in the natural world and to better understand the large-scale, long-term role that humans play. Listening to the people who were kind enough to share their wisdom and stories with us during the filming process made me more conscious of the bigger picture and that what I do today will matter 200 years from now. What was your most interesting discovery about X issue while

filming TEK? One of the more interesting things to come out of the interviews for me was Gregg Castro's comment on the fact that the government was putting sites such as solar and wind projects on top of cultural sites. As an archaeologist I know that cultural sites are supposed to be protected and managed so it was interesting to hear that environmental projects were sometimes able to be green lighted over tribal protests. It was not a surprise per se but it made me conceptualize a few things.

Where was TEK filmed? This film relied on the natural beauty of springtime in Northern California. As you will see in the film, this region is blessed with a number of ecological communities from sandy beaches to rugged mountains, lush riparian zones, and its famous fertile valleys. Two of my favorite locations were Fern Canyon on the Northern California coast and the foothills outside of Chico, California.




TEK is often handed down through traditional songs, stories, and beliefs.




