

Course Description

This course studies characteristic developmental changes in and environmental influences on human infants from conception to approximately two years of age. Special emphasis is on sensory-perceptual abilities, social-emotional interactions, and cognitive developmental processes. Guided observations of infants are required.

Assignments

Observation Assignments: Students will complete video observations of infants regarding 3 developmental domains (social emotional, cognitive, and motor development). Students will be asked to apply concepts learned during the course to answer questions about infant development. Descriptions of infant development should be written objectively (avoid inferences).
