Often, professors assign what is easy for them to grade, rather than what will help the students understand the material and apply gained knowledge. Advisers are often unaware of the rules and/or requirements and make many errors, which are costly for students. This causes undo stress and burden on students. The only time I felt a sense of community with students from majors significantly different from mine was in the Upper Division Honors GE Theme (which is now extinct) and in Momentum Dance Club.</p> <p>When encountering faculty and older staff members who didn't know me personally, there seemed to be a lack of initial engagement. I perceived this to come from a disbelief on the faculty/staff member's part that every student was serious about ensuring his/her success and learning in class. After consulting with faculty/staff members who did know me and could be frank with me, I discovered this was not far from the truth. The president is concerned with lifting the prestige of this school by coming down hard on alcohol and the Greek life organizations - but I think he should tackle this problem at the root, which is the students admitted to this university in the first place. I think higher admission standards need to be set in place, which could mean that prospective students with lower grades may need to prove their salt with extracurricular activities and admission essays.</p> <p>I honestly believe that a stronger campus-wide sense of community can be established if each student CAN BE assumed to be serious about their education.</p>

Senior	Full-time	Female	<p>To a certain extent, this evaluation wasn't entirely fair to the institution because I'm a first year transfer student who came here not knowing anybody, so it has been hard for me to build a social circle. This has contributed to some minor depression which has made it difficult for me to reach out and become more involved in campus life, although I have been trying. I'm going to be honest here, though, by saying that I was really disappointed by the academic advisor for my major; I felt intimidated and helpless when discussing my transfer coursework here, and I was very surprised to find that they are much, much snootier about accepting transfer coursework from other colleges (even from my other 4-year university) than UC Santa Cruz was, and I had been given to believe that the CSUs were better in this respect than the UCs. I am planning on fighting to have my 3 basic Anthropology major courses from Santa Cruz transferred here so that I can actually graduate in 2 years (if I have to take all three classes over again, I will have to stay on at least one more semester), but I am not optimistic as I have heard from many other students that they have refused to transfer their classes; as for the reasoning behind the refusal to accept these classes (that they are lower division at other colleges or universities and 'upper' division here, although they actually seem to be middle; it's very confusing here), I have spoken with students who have said that the classes were the same difficulty level as ones they had already taken at other institutions. I have to admit that I'm somewhat at a loss as to what to do, and if I do have to spend more time here taking classes that I have already taken, it will definitely color my view of the university.</p>

Which is not how it had been at the tutoring centers at Community colleges. I used to be able to go to two hour-sessions each week at a tutoring center at the community college and get help. Now I am struggling to succeed in many courses with no help from tutors and minimal help from office hours.</p>
