I. Call to Order

a. Meeting called to order 10:02 am. Agenda was motioned to be approved. Moved by Alejandra, second by Harmony, motion carried 4-0-0.

II. Approval of Minutes – 3.8.18

a. Alisa moved to postpone the approval of the minutes until the end due to current lack of quorum.

III. New Business

a. Discussion Items -

i. Work Study Presentations in order of receipt

1. Hands-on Experiences (NSC) - \$8,500

Aranguren presented what the Hands On Experience performs, and how work study funding allows their students to train and grant them opportunities for teaching, educating and practicing what they learn. Asking for a slightly higher allocation due to Live Scan and minimum wage increases. Some questions about current allocation; Aranguren explained that the funding just ran out for this year.

2. SAGE (COB) - \$5,000

DeBerg explained how his program is creating next-gen entrepreneurial leaders who prioritize mentoring, curriculum and competition. He asked for \$5000 (\$2500 was what was given last year; DeBerg said this was acceptable), and that the money will be mostly spent in the spring

semester after being questioned on why funding was still being shown for this year.

3. Food Insecurity Prevention Program (NSC) - \$6,000

Trivedi and Chavez spotlighted how their program helps students with food access and education. Some of this includes access to the food pantry, assisting with signing up for CalFresh, and providing opportunities for mentoring and workshops.

4. The Orion (CME) - \$5,000

Rocha gave a presentation on how work study assists the Orion with ad revenue through its student caller positions, and that the paper would be greatly impacted without those roles being funded.

5. Museum of Anthropology (BSS) - \$7,900

Scott gave an overview of the Valene Smith Anthropology Museum both as an educational program and community outreach, and explained how work study greatly helps the museum's mission to better connect with the public and the benefits of experience gained from working on its exhibits.

6. College of Humanities and Fine Arts - \$75,980

Alexander wanted to call attention to the minimum wage increase and how it will impact HFA as a whole. Provided numbers on how much the department would be affected over the next two years. Short discussion occurred.

7. Discussion

After the presenters left a quick roundtable took place. Work study voting will take place April 14.
