<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What are Catalog Rights? They establish what classes are required for your degree and are normally based on the year you entered college. It is a contract that protects you from changes to the program while you are a student. For more information https://www.csuchico.edu/apss/catalog/catalog-library.shtml#catalogrights
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • How long is the PETE program? It takes about two to two and half years depending on the completion of Human Anatomy and Human Physiology prior to the program.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What PETE courses can transfer to CSU Chico? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Lower Division transfers: Human Anatomy (w/lab - 4 units) and Human Physiology (w/lab - 4 units). ○ Upper Division Transfers: Consult with PETE Adviser (must provide course description and possibly syllabi and more evidence of content covered). ○ Swimming, Tennis, and one adviser-approved Activity Course. ○ Elective Units.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • How do I check my Degree Progress? Log in to portal, go to the Student Center, and click on Degree Progress Report. Requirements with a yellow circle indicate in progress and requirements in red indicate they have not been met.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When do I apply for graduation? Apply 2 semesters in advance of your expected graduation date.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What other tests count for the credential program's Basic Skill Test requirement? CSU Early Assessment Program, CSU Placement Exams, SAT, ACT, AP exams, and a few others. See the advisor for more information.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When will I know my placement for the credential program? Priority placements are usually processed within a 1-2 months after application submission. All other placements are processed within a 2-3 months after application submission. No guarantees for placement if you still have outstanding application requirements.
