

**Subject:** Significant Change to the BS in Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management

Upon the recommendation of the Academic Senate and with the concurrence of the Provost, I approve a Significant Change to the BS in Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management. The number of units for the major will change from 55-67 to 58-60 due to reducing units in the core and updating the curriculum in the options. This change will be effective fall 2020.

Established in 1962, the department has grown over the past 57 years to offer five options (Community and Commercial Recreation; Parks and Natural Resources Management; Recreation Therapy; Event Management; and Resort and Lodging Management), two minors (Recreation Administration and Tourism), four General Education courses, and a strong service learning program offered to all CSU, Chico students. We believe that leisure can significantly improve lives, and our shared goal is to make lives better for others. Our graduates help people to escape their daily lives by running hotels, resorts, outdoor recreation, and tourism businesses. They help people lead more fulfilling lives through recreation therapy, children’s programs, and community activities. They maintain and improve our parks and natural and cultural resources. They create learning environments by organizing tours and planning conventions. They create memorable experiences, from enjoyable restaurant meals to entertaining music festivals.

Program expansion has increased choices for students but also changed the number of majors in each option. Consolidating two options (Parks and Natural Resources and Community and Commercial Recreation and Tourism) as Parks and Recreation Management enables the department to offer students a single option with an emphasis in park management or recreation management while maintaining the historic linkages to youth development, community quality of life, and access to open space common to both. Combining the two options maintains breadth but in a more cost-effective manner.

By combining two options we can continue to support the University Strategic Plan and Diversity Action Plan (now incorporated into the Strategic Plan) by offering nationally accredited professional preparation programs in recreation, hospitality, and parks management. Our programs are distinct, our experiences are transformative, and our scholarship advances our understanding

important and timely issues. We offer professional preparation programs that contribute to quality of life and well-being, provide opportunities for travel and advancement, and help sustain natural and human resources. We also offer service learning opportunities that incorporate career awareness in partnership with TRiO/SSS, Men of Chico, Latinas in Action, and Mobilize Green.

These proposed program changes do not lessen our support for the Academic Plan. We will continue to prepare students for lifelong success in careers and life. We will continue to pursue excellence in teaching and seek to remain among the top ten majors in student degree completion. Our partnerships and course offerings will enable us to sustain diverse and connected communities. Our faculty and staff will continue to invest in professional development and utilize their time and talents in thoughtful and intentional curriculum design. And we will continue to be creative in our efforts to secure resources to enhance opportunities for students.

Resorts and Lodging Management (RLM) and Events Management (EM) are the two largest options in the department and their content is deeply intertwined. The faculty determined that EM students needed to learn how the front office of a hotel works (RHPM 354) since they will often be booking events in hotels, and that RLM students needed to understand convention and meeting management (RHPM 470) since the majority of these events are held in hotels. It was also determined that the RLM students needed a better understanding of social media as a business tool as well as other business promotional strategies (RHPM 422).**

**Department Core Classes, 32 units (effective Fall 2020)**  
**Department of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management**

**Foundations of Recreation, Hospitality and Parks Management (RHPM 200) 3 units**

First professional preparation course for majors and minors. Prerequisite to all upper-division required recreation courses for majors and minors. Sociology and social psychology of leisure. History of leisure in Western cultures. Philosophical foundations of leisure studies. Ethics and foundations of professional practice. Introduction to the principal professional organizations. Career and course of study planning.

**Professional Resources for Recreation, Hospitality and Parks Management (RHPM 201) 1 units**

Exploration of the use of professional tools, resources, and applications for group communication, presentations, and data management. Introduction to self-assessment tools for managers. Focus on campus resources for student success and industry-specific group projects.

**Program Planning (RHPM 220) 3 units**

Theory and process of event program planning, design, implementation, and evaluation as applicable to a variety of agencies, organizations, businesses, and communities. Exposure to several types of programs serving different age groups, interests, and needs within a range of environments. Recruitment, use, and supervision of volunteers.

**Recreation Therapy and Inclusion (RHPM 326W) 3 units**

A study of the characteristics and needs of diverse populations, specifically related to the delivery of inclusive leisure services. In-depth discussion of personal and societal attitudes, stereotypes, cultural competencies, legislation, accessibility, and program modification. Learning experiences include volunteer work, guest speakers, and wheelchair experience. This course is applicable to all disciplines dealing with diverse populations.

**Leisure Science (RHPM 300) 3 units**

Applications of science in recreation and parks management, including needs assessment and evaluation methods. Interpretation of research literature. Use of technology for data management and analysis.

**Leadership and Supervision (RHPM 301) 3 units**

Study of the nature, scope, status, and historical development of professional leadership. Professional preparation for recreation, hospitality, and parks management of personnel. Examination of professional body of knowledge, group dynamics, and theories of leadership.

**Customer Service Management in Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks (RHPM 371) 3 units**

Comprehensive knowledge of managing customer service in recreation, park, hospitality, and tourism operations. Methods for identifying customer service expectations; developing a service culture; setting quality standards; developing policies, procedures, and systems to assure quality customer service; managing personnel for quality customer service; developing techniques for service recovery; and measuring customer satisfaction.

**Management of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks (RHPM 400) 3 units**

Legalities, policies, practices, procedures, principles, and theory related to planning, organizing, staffing, training, motivating, controlling, evaluating, financing, and managing resources in parks, recreation, and hospitality environments.

**Budgeting and Finance in Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management (RHPM 420) 3 units**

Management approaches to budget and finance in recreation, hospitality, and park agencies and businesses; spread sheet skills; budget preparations, forecasting, accounting techniques, pricing, financial analysis, and capital acquisition. Review of revenue sources, and capital funding.

**Legal Principles of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management (RHPM 428) 3 units**

Introduction to the study of law applicable to recreation, hospitality, and parks management. Examines general legal principles, organizational structure, contracts and contracting for recreation, hospitality, and park settings. Introduces human resources law, liability and litigation, and special topics which apply to hotels, restaurants, events, recreation, and parks providers.

**Internship Program (comprised of three courses)**

**Internship Preparation (RHPM 584) 1 unit**

**Internship Seminar (RHPM 586) 1 units**

**Internship (RHPM 589/589M) (40 hours/week for 14 weeks) 12 units**

**Parks and Recreation Management Option Classes, 28 units (effective Fall 2020)**  
**Department of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management**

**Outdoor Recreation Systems (RHPM 240) 3 units**

Resources and needs for outdoor recreation: managing people and natural resources to provide quality outdoor recreation experiences. Study of historic, social, political, economic, and environmental factors influencing natural resources recreation at federal, state, and local levels. Survey of conflicts in natural resource land use. Field trips may be required.

**Choice of one of the following two courses**

**Principles of Event Management (RHPM 323) 3 units**

Introduction to event management fundamentals and overview of the event industry. Topics include strategic planning, logistics, operations, financial management, risk management, and sustainability in event operations.

Or

**Methods and materials for Environmental Education (RHPM 448) 3 units**

Experiential-oriented survey of methods and materials for teaching environmental concepts in schools, communities, nature centers, camps, and parks. Exposure to history, theory, philosophy, and goals of environmental education programs.

**Systems Management in Maintenance and Operations (RHPM 342) 3 units**

Overview of maintenance planning and implementation from a systems perspective. Topics include strategies to enhance guest experiences, reduce depreciative behaviors, and maintain facilities and settings.

**Citizen Involvement in Recreation Resource Management (RHPM 441) 3 units**

Theoretical and applied concepts and techniques of citizen involvement in policy and management decisions for both public and private sectors of recreation resource management. Discussion of legal mandates, agency/organization credibility, applied methods for obtaining citizen input, and case studies. Attendance at public meetings may be required.

**Choice of one of the following two courses**

**Leisure Services Promotion (RHPM 422) 3 units**

Introduction to marketing concepts; application of promotion in recreation, hospitality, and parks through the development of promotional materials for programs, organizations, and events. Creation of program, organization, and business promotional strategies, including message design, promotion creation, and evaluation.

Or

**Environmental Interpretation and Communication (RHPM 444) 3 units**

Theory and application of environmental interpretation services to visitors in natural and cultural resource settings. Communication of environmental information to general public via media presentations, conducted trips, exhibits, nature trails, publications, and visitor centers. 3 hours lecture.

**Choice of one of the following two courses**

**Natural Resources Management (RHPM 446) 3 units**

Managing the interactions between natural resources and users to ensure sustainable outdoor recreation. Carrying capacity, limits of acceptable change, competition, and complementarity among recreation uses and between recreation uses and other resource uses. Methods for monitoring recreational impacts, and approaches to managing resource quality and recreational opportunities. Field trip may be required.

Or

**Commercial Recreation Operation (RHPM 524) 3 units**

Management of private and commercial recreation programs, areas, and facilities. Considers planning, organizing, financing, staffing, operation, evaluation, facility use, and operational effectiveness and efficiency. Explores a broad range of private and commercial operations. 3 hours lecture.

**Special Event Planning and Operations (RHPM 523) 1 unit**

Experiential course offering students hands-on experience with aspects of planning and implementation of an event, including design, marketing, staffing, operations, risk management, and evaluation.

**Option Select 9 units**

Any RHPM course or other course with advisor approval.

## **Resorts and Lodging Management Option Classes, 27 units (effective Fall 2020)** **Department of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management**

### **Hospitality and Tourism Industry Introduction (RHPM 250) 3 units**

Overview of the hospitality industry and its core businesses, including hotels and resorts, restaurants, clubs, theme parks, events, and cruise lines. Review of current issues and trends affecting various segments of the hospitality industry.

### **Food and Beverage Management (RHPM 350) 3 units**

Organization, and management of food service in restaurants, hotels and related settings.

### **Resort/Lodging Management (RHPM 354) 3 units**

Exploration of the internal operations of hotels and resorts, including responsibilities, and administration of hotel front office operations, night audit, housekeeping, etc. Topics also include: service delivery, pricing, and inventory management in the resort and lodging industry. Some field trips may be required.

### **Leisure Services Promotion (RHPM 422) 3 units**

Introduction to marketing concepts: application of promotion in recreation, hospitality, and parks through the development of promotional materials for programs, organizations, and events. Creation of program, organization, and business promotional strategies, including message design, promotion creation, and evaluation.

### **Resort/Lodging Planning and Development (RHPM 452) 3 units**

This course provides information in understanding hotel management, especially hotel development and operations. This course helps students to understand how hotel performances are evaluated. Internet research is utilized and students prepare to understand current issues in the hotel industry. Some field trips on certain dates may be required in this class.

### **Meeting and Conference Planning (RHPM 470) 3 units**

Overview of meetings and conferences and their major components. Topics include site selection, meeting design, financial management, marketing, operations, meeting technology, contracting and risk management, and sustainability with conferences and meetings.

### **Strategic Management in Hospitality (RHPM 558) 3 units**

This is a capstone course which considers strategic management approaches to hospitality operations. The course draws on concepts in hospitality operations, such as lodging planning and design, event management, marketing, finance, security/risk management, problem solving in resort/lodging management, and management trends. Various case studies in hospitality are evaluated and discussed. Some field trips may be required in this course.

### **Option Select 9 units**

Any RHPM course or other course with advisor approval.

## **Events Management Option Classes, 28 units (effective Fall 2020)**

### **Department of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management**

#### **Hospitality and Tourism Industry Introduction (RHPM 250) 3 units**

Overview of the industry and its core businesses, including hotels and resorts, restaurants, clubs, theme parks, events, and cruise lines. Review of current issues and trends affecting various segments of the industry.

#### **Principles of Event Management (RHPM 323) 3 units**

Introduction to event management fundamentals and overview of the event industry. Topics include strategic planning, logistics, operations, financial management, risk management, and sustainability in event operations.

#### **Food and Beverage Management (RHPM 350) 3 units**

Organization, administration, and management of food service in restaurants, hotels and related settings.

#### **Resort/Lodging Management (RHPM 354) 3 units**

Exploration of the internal operations of hotels and resorts, including responsibilities, and administration of hotel front office operations, night audit, housekeeping, etc. Topics also include: service delivery, pricing, and inventory management in the resort and lodging industry. Some field trips may be required.

#### **Leisure Services Promotion (RHPM 422) 3 units**

Introduction to marketing concepts; application of promotion in recreation, hospitality, and parks through the development of promotional materials for programs, organizations, and events. Creation of program, organization, and business promotional strategies, including message design, promotion creation, and evaluation.

#### **Special Events Planning and Operations (RHPM 523) 1 unit**

Experiential course offering students hands-on experience with aspects of planning and implementation of an event, including design, marketing, staffing, operations, risk management, and evaluation. 3 hours laboratory. You may take this course more than once for a maximum of 3.0 units.

#### **Choice of one of the following two courses**

#### **Meeting and Conference Planning (RHPM 470) 3 units**

Overview of meetings and conferences and their major components. Topics include site selection, meeting design, financial management, marketing, operations, meeting technology, contracting and risk management, and sustainability with conferences and meetings.

Or

**Program Management in Recreation Therapy (RHPM 466) 3 units**

Application of knowledge and skills in planning, implementing, and evaluating inclusive recreation programs for diverse populations. Course topics include volunteer management, marketing, public relations, funding, risk management, evaluation, and problem-solving.

Requires out-of-class activity. Applicable to all human service fields.

Any RHPM course or other course with advisor approval.

RHPM 326W Recreation Therapy and Inclusion (W) 3.0 FS W

The second major-designated Writing course is the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GW) ([Executive Order 665](#)). Students must earn a C- or higher to receive GW credit. The GE Written Communication (A2) requirement must be completed before a student is permitted to register for a GW course.

## Grading Requirement:

All courses taken to fulfill major course requirements must be taken for a letter grade except those courses specified by the department as Credit/No Credit grading only.

## Application to the Major:

Departmental approval is required before you begin course work for this major. Application to the major can be made at the department office.

## Course Requirements for the Major: **55-67 58-60** units

Completion of the following courses, or their approved transfer equivalents, is required of all candidates for this degree. Additional required courses, depending upon the selected option are outlined following the major core program requirements.

Note: A maximum of 15 units of internship (courses numbered 189, 289, 389, 489, 589) may be applied to a bachelor's degree at CSU, Chico.

Since the Department of Recreation, Hospitality, and Parks Management uses a mentor-advisor system, it is important for you to request an advisor when you declare Recreation, **Hospitality, and Parks Management Administration** as your major. In general, Recreation, **Hospitality, and Parks Management Administration** majors are encouraged to take RHPM 200 ~~and RHPM 201~~ during the first semester in the department. Depending on the desired option, RHPM 250 (for the Options in Resort and Lodging Management and Event Management) or RHPM 240 (for the Options in ~~Community/Commercial Recreation and Tourism and Parks and Recreation Natural Resource Management~~) ~~or RHPM 326W (for the Option in Recreation Therapy)~~ should also be considered.
