From recruitment and preparation for successful retention and graduation in providing opportunities to engage and connect in Fraternity and Sorority Affairs (FSA). Student Organizations and Leadership Education (SOLE) engages a diverse population of students, helps them connect and get involved, as well as focus on affinity interests and leadership skills that support retention, satisfaction, degree commitment, and academic distinction. Finally, the operations of the office and its programs are geared toward efforts that improve institutional commitment, thus enhancing not only retention to graduation, but continued engagement as alums of the University.

- Conducted mini safety, academic, involvement, mental health, and personal conduct presentations in all council meetings throughout the year. As a result of these discussions, the department and Greek community accomplished the following:
 - Collaboration and presentations by Safe Place, WellCat Prevention, CAVE, Student Learning Center, Recreation sports and University Advancement staff with resources left with students.
 - Partnerships to maximize fundraising campaigns for Greek Week, Giving Day, and various opportunities off campus.
- Hosted 1st Greek Unity Workshop with all three councils that furnished a global, historical educational understanding and awareness of each recognized Greek organization on Chico State's campus. Throughout the two-hour workshop, students were thoroughly engaged and benefited from the following activities:
 - In chronological Founding order, each of the 31 organizations presented its name, charter date, founding location, significance of its establishment, philanthropy, and service areas.
 - ⇒ This exercise demonstrated the compelling ideals and context by which Greek organizations were uniquely established.
- Onboarded 1st Historically Black Greek Sorority to the Multicultural Greek Council (MGC)
 after many years of mutual engagement. This mutual beneficial partnership has initiated
 cross cultural learning within the council and its chapters. The campus now has an
 opportunity to support another of its cultural organizations while students cultivate diverse
 and inclusionary practices.
 - ⇒ Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. was excited to join the Multicultural Greek Council and immediately united with members.
- Onboarded the original Historically Black Greek Fraternity to the Multicultural Greek Council after the organization spent many years unaffiliated. This re-establishment has made the MGC and its chapters stronger to receive another fraternity.
 - ⇒ Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. brings a wealth of support and cultural spirit to the MGC. The council and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity are excited to work together.

- FSA hosted an Education and Unity Workshop involving a cultural presentation and experience for the campus. All councils participated and completed a fun bingo quiz activity together.
 - o A culturally historic movement and performance demonstration and choreography, presented by one of the first artists to deliver the African dance craft of *Stepping* to the West Coast. Greek student leaders challenged themselves to learn history and cultural dance, together. The 'Stepmaster', Vernon Jackson shared his love and experiences of teaching this global dance, highlighting his rich journey in Hollywood by performing in Fresh Prince of Bel Air School Daze and a few talk shows.
 - ⇒ This exercise culminated in a fully choreographed cultural stepping performance by all three Greek councils.
- FSA hosted this academic year's FSA Awards Ceremony with keynote Kevin Bracy who is a renown, African American Motivational Entertainer. He delivered a profound message of being great and navigating through life's struggles. He shared his life story and gifted each attendee with a copy of his book, "Scared Great". The impact of the speaker's presentation and book was remarkable.
- FSA hosted a Title IX and Anti-Hazing Training with Guest presenter, Attorney Jennifer St. Preux. All council members were required to attend. Attorney Jennifer shared her background and heritage, as a Haitian female.

- Wildcat Welcome by the Numbers:
 - Amount of Events
 - Fall: SLL and our campus partners hosted 75 events over three weeks for new students. The seven colleges hosted a "college welcome", giving us the most comprehensive academic welcome, we have ever had.
 - Spring: This was the first year we had a true Spring Wildcat Welcome. SLL and our campus partners hosted 35 events over three weeks for new students

- Conducted FSA Title IX Training with 100% attendance which was a significant improvement from previous years.
 - 100% attendance from all three councils and In-Person video recordings were presented to ensure each Greek member had the opportunity to receive training.
- Due to In-Person return, recruitment numbers increased in comparison to previous year. All three councils were able to welcome new members and meet goals set last year.
- Increase in mental health resources for Greek members. Resources were given at weekly meetings and numerous campus wide offerings were shared.

V. Key Objectives for Next Academic Year

- Increase campus use of CatsConnect for all of Chico State Campus.
- Streamline the SOEAF Application process to run through the same process as all other funding requests.
- Modify the recognition process for student organizations to become recognized annually.
- Design organization management system- records and history of chapters.
- Continue to onboard additional Black Greek Organizations affiliated with NPHC.
- Foster Inclusivity and Diversity: Implement programs and training sessions that promote
 inclusivity, equity, and diversity within the Greek community. Encourage dialogue and
 understanding among members, and support initiatives that create a welcoming and
 inclusive environment for students from diverse backgrounds.
- Strengthen Alumni Engagement: Develop strategies to engage and involve fraternity and sorority alumni in the department's activities. Foster a strong alumni network, provide opportunities for mentorship, and encourage alumni to support the growth and development of Greek organizations.
- Enhance Campus Collaboration: Strengthen partnerships and collaboration with other departments, student organizations, and campus entities to promote a holistic student experience. Explore joint programming opportunities, co-sponsorship of events, and shared resources to maximize impact and engagement.
