

K@T Lesson Outline of an *Extraordinary* museum experience for Kids at the Turner

Name of the project: Shapes and Personality

Kids will: On a piece of paper, watercolor paper is best, paint various shapes in different sizes and different colors with watercolors. They can be whatever they would like! Try to keep open space between the shapes so they are not bleeding together. After the watercolor dries, draw with pencil a face onto the shape. Try using different shapes for the facial features. Each shape can have a different personality! Have fun with it! After drawing it on with pencil they can go over it with a dark pen or marker to make the face stand out more.

Key Terms: Shapes, Personality, Open Space


Materials: Paper, Watercolor Paints, Brushes, Pencil, Marker/Pen

What appears to have been extraordinary: I found the ability to experiment with different shapes and faces to create so many characters to be very extraordinary.



Here I started with some fun and random shapes in different colors. Feel free to be explore different textures and possibilities with this part. Later I added some more because I wanted less open space and more shapes.



After the paint dried, I started adding faces to the shapes. I tried to give each one a different personality by making their facial features have different shapes as well. Some of them had square eyes while some had triangle or circle eyes. This is a great time to experiment with different ways to draw a face.



All of these shapes have different eyes, mouths, and noses and as a result they all have different personalities. Feel free to experiment and have fun!
